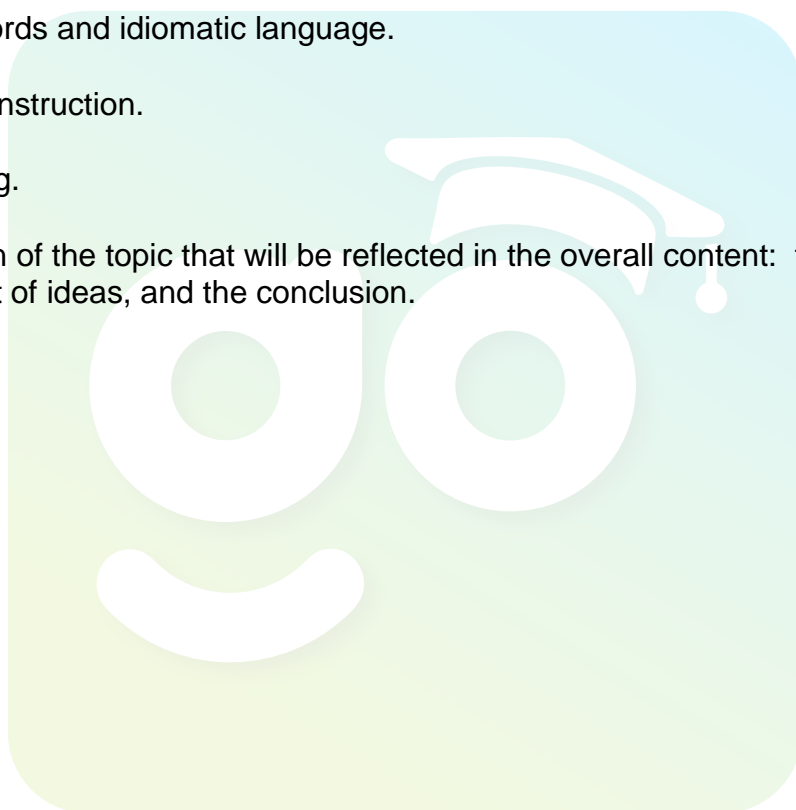

INFORMATION FOR THE MARKER

In assessing a candidate's work, the following aspects, among others, drawn from the assessment rubric, must be borne in mind.

- The overall effect of planning, drafting, proofreading and editing of the work on the final text produced.
- Awareness of writing for a specific purpose, audience and context – as well as register, style and tone – especially in SECTION B.
- Grammar, spelling and punctuation.
- Language structures, including an awareness of critical language.
- Choice of words and idiomatic language.
- Sentence construction.
- Paragraphing.
- Interpretation of the topic that will be reflected in the overall content: the introduction, development of ideas, and the conclusion.

- Give credit for appropriateness of format.
- Look for a logical approach in all writing.

NOTE:

- The points given below each topic serve only as a guide to markers.
- Allowance must be made for a candidate's own interpretation of the topic, even if it differs from the given points or a marker's own views or interpretations.

SECTION A: ESSAY**QUESTION 1**

Candidates are required to write ONE essay of 350–400 words on ONE of the given topics.

- Candidates may give literal/figurative/philosophical responses.
- Candidates may write in any genre: narrative, descriptive, reflective, argumentative, discursive, or any combination of these.

- The words must appear in the essay. **[50]**

- Should be empowering/motivational/inspirational [25]

- Accept formal or informal format
- Formal register
